I made this booklet to help with your familiarization of our school. I really wish that you get the best out of your exchange in Finland, and what from I've heard, it's not impossible.


This booklet will give you very basic information about general things. It's not a full encyclopedia of our school, so you will probably have to engage into a conversation with locals for

#### **About Finland**

Finland is well known for it's good education level. Finland is also known for sauna and its close relationship to lakes both in winter, in form of ice swimming in the winter and in summer for the more common practice of skinny-dipping.

We love our cottage life almost as much as we love sauna. In the summer Finland moves to the country side, if possible, and sleepy little towns, that have any kind of lake near-by, wake up.

In the autumn its possible to pick wild berries and mushrooms, in the winter it's time for skiing and ice skating. Spring is a great season to come up with any kind of reasons to celebrate and summer is for enjoying. The biggest summer festivity is undoubtedly midsummers eve. It's on the first Saturday after the 19th

of June, and it's called Juhannus in Finnish. During this celebration the towns become quiet and in the "Nightless Night" people burn bonfires all over Finland to celebrate Juhannus.

### Finnish history in very short

Finland has been part of Sweden and Russia, but even before that, right after the last ice age, there have been settlement in Finland.

Finland was first part of Sweden. Finland became a sore topic between Russia and Sweden in the 1100 century, as this little patch of land was an access to the Baltic Sea for Russia. It was only a matter of time before Russia took Finland over in 1809 and made it an autonomous grand duchy. Finland declared itself independent on 6th of December 1917 and was recognized as independent country by other countries on the 4th of January 1918. The Independence Day of Finland is on the 6th of December.

Quite soon after it's independence Finland had a civil war and fought in World War II.

Finland became a member of the United Nations in the 1955 and it also

joined OECD in 1969. Finland joined the European Union in 1995.

Finland's capital is Helsinki, which is roughly an hour car drive along the highway or 45 minutes by train from Lahti.

#### About Lahti

Lahti is founded 1.11.1905, and it hasn't been very long since the city had it's 100 year birthday. Lahti is located at a crossroad of different transportation routes; highway and railroad. Lahti has great access to waterways but that has become less used for transporting goods, and more for leisure.

Lahti is Finland's 8th biggest city and Lahti has been developing itself to become a very environmentally aware city. It wishes to become involved in an international network and through this, help create an environmentally aware city. Lahti also wants to increase the environmental awareness and it's looking in to more energy efficient solutions Lahti encourages environmentally aware schooling and also encourages interest in sustainable development.

One of Lahti's best qualities is the clean good tasting tap water. This is a benefit from the sandy hills that make the most of the city's profile.

If you arrive in the winter or early spring remember that we have little sunlight and the weather is cold, sometimes the temperature drops even to -30 °C.

#### Look into Lahti's history

As mentioned in Finland's history that the country has had population ever since the stone age. Lahti is partially an archeological a digging site for some stone age artefacts. If you visit the skiing museum you will learn more about this history.

Lahti has had inhabitants, since the stone age, but it became a city just before the independency of Finland. It is said that Lahti was founded by the power of beer, breweries that needed workers actually created the city. Lahti still has something left from the brewery history. For example a company called Hartwall and a small brewery Teerenpeli (which I could recommend...).

Lahti has long been as a recognized wood working city. Lahti has some of the biggest furniture manufacturers and wood refineries in Finland. Lahti also had glass factory which was, for some time, the biggest in window glass producing factory in Finland, but has since scaled down and is now owned by Pilkington.

The market square of Lahti has a very long history, maybe not as a place but as an event. It was proposed to the Swedish crown in 1672 parliament that Lahti would be allowed to have a market on the 1st and 2nd day of august. They got permission, and still today the market is held first Wednesday of every month.



Most of the schools staff speak English, and if they don't they will find someone who does. I do encourage you to ask if you need help, as said before; Finns are very helpful.








# Floor Plan 2nd Floor


But when you arrive here and start studying in your department, you are free to contact them, preferably trough mail, but in case of emergency also by phone.



Also is you want to connect your own devices to the school network you have to have it checked by the school staff first for viruses etc. To access the web you may freely use the blue network cables in classes. They are called "Vieras" (guest) cables. The school has also a wireless network, but it requires you to sign in with your user name and password.

The school has a nurse on service at Svinhufvudinkatu 2 A in Lahti. To see the nurse is free and she will decide if you need further attention. You can contact even a dentist trough there or a psychologist if that is needed.

The school offers all exchange students, a Finnish language course.

When you arrive to our school you will be given a certificate of studying

which will allow you to receive several different discounts.

To open a bank account in Finland you need your student certificate and your passport, Nordea in particular is very good for exchange students.

You will receive upon arriving a printing allowance of 18 euros and you can eat the lunch in the school cafeteria for a discount price. Spring 2011 the price was 2,50 for salad, main course, drinks and bread.

If you run out of your printing allowance, you can always get more from the cafeteria. First you pay the wanted amount to the cafeteria staff (minimum of 5 euros) and then take your receipt to Jouko Mattila in his office at the second floor. The office is in Antinsali, his door is close to the entrance to Antinsali. Jouko Mattila will then add the amount you paid to your user account.

#### Free days

Finnish bank holidays are referred as red days in Finnish speech. This is because these days are marked red in the calendars. During these days almost all the shops are closed and hospitals take only emergencies. Yes, even the Lahti Institute of Design and Fine Arts is closed and students can work on their projects...

The bank holidays timed on Sundays won't show in this list, but they will not affect the daily living much more than any normal Sunday.

#### **Furat**

A grocery store for those with more eastern European taste. Can be found in the corner of Verijärvenkatu and Kulmakatu.

Place to shop for fresh groceries and delicacies for example Finnish cheese and imported cheese. This place is open monday to Friday from 08-17 and on Saturdays form 08-14:30. It's a long hall way trough the building right next to the market square.
